But don't despair - there are plenty of tricks that can help you turn into a puzzle master. Remember that the more difficult the puzzle, the more satisfying it is to fill the latter square. The contents of the crossword puzzle are a bit like cobwebs; each response is connected to others nearby, forming a woven network of letters. Jerking on one string of letters affects all the others, too. Most crosswords are naturally divided into several groups of up and down clues, combined with other groups with longer responses. With that in mind, working through the puzzle of one group of columns at a time - as opposed to going through all the clues at once and then all the clues - is a good strategy. There will also be times when the answers come from a language such as Arabic or Russian, whose alphabets are completely different from the Latin alphabet used by most Western countries. As a result, there are often many accepted spellings for these translated words. Typically, this part of punctuation indicates that the tip itself is a game of words, as opposed to a simple question that requires an answer or fill-in blank [source: Sayles]. There will always be times when you think you know what the answer is, but you can't be 100 percent sure. Do you take a chance and write in guessing or not? If the answer to the question intersects with yet another can-it-is-maybe-it-isn't clue, skip it for now. Writing in bad answers can lead to strays, especially if you are one of the brave souls who prefer to do puzzles in a pen. Instead, rely on the answers that you know are correct to bring you back to safe territory. Advertising There is absolutely no shame in relying on a reference book. Some of the basic benefits of crossword puzzles are the extension of one's own knowledge and vocabulary. If you've solved all the clues down in one cluster, but one of the answers you received isn't the term you're familiar with, pull your trusty Oxford English Dictionary off the shelf. Either you learn that the word is correct and add something new to the phraseology, or you will discover that some of your answers to the down need to be rethought.
